ISPRS Centenary 2010 The International Society of Photogrammetry and Remote Sensing centenary will be celebrated on July 4, 2010 at its origin, the Vienna University of Technology. A \$688 million project, it's purpose is to replace approximately 16,000 km of open channel with 8,800 km of reticulated piping to provide water for urban and rural use throughout the South Mallee and Wimmera regions of Victoria. CARTOGRAPHERS of RENOWN (Six degrees of separation)

This is a global project where cartographers from different regions around the world are selecting their best and brightest cartographers down through the centuries.

The regions are North America; Latin America; Europe (West / East); Scandinavia; Middle East; Asia; Oceania; Africa (*Are they representative?*)

Once the debate is concluded for each region, a list will be finalised and made available on the International Cartographic Association, Commission on Education and Training website. Stage two will involve an investigation into the strength of the professional links between the cartographers from the different world regions (hence the term "six degrees of separation").

At the AMC / MSIA national conference in March 2009 the delegates were asked to name their Australian cartographers of renown down through the centuries. Below is a list of those who were identified. Naturally enough the 20th Century was the most populated and will possibly be the most debated.

<u>Oceania</u>

17th CENTURY

Hessel Gerritz was for many years the official cartographer to the Dutch East India Company

18th CENTURY

Matthew Flinders Major Mitchell

19th CENTURY

John Arrowsmith (1780-1873) was an English geographer (mapmaker) and member of the Arrowsmith family of geographers. In 1834 John published his *London Atlas*, which were the best set of such maps then in existence. He followed the atlas with a long series of elaborate and carefully executed maps, those of <u>Australia</u>, <u>America</u>, <u>Africa</u> and <u>India</u> being especially valuable.
