Thirty participants attended a recent hands-on Workshop on Cartography in Tehran, Iran. The workshop, held from 9th to 13th May 2009, was hosted and organised by the National Cartographic Center (NCC) of Iran and the ICA Commission on Education and Training. Participants were primarily NCC staff involved in map production associated with the publishing of country maps, city maps, street directories and atlases. The workshop was presented by the MSIA President, David Fraser and Colin Arrowsmith from

The Ultimate Interactive Atlas of the World (ISNB: 978-1-8456-6522-7) is an Australian publication designed and produced by Quarto Children's Books Ltd. The Atlas "combines a collection of accurate maps of the world, detailed information and interactive features – pop-ups, pull-outs, sliders and flaps –

that together aim to make learning about the world a fun experience" so says the publisher. I purchased the 2008 edition for \$12 and I must say it is great value and lives up to the publisher's description. If you want to introduce children to cartography then this is a great book to use. Particularly appealing is the two-dimensional map that converts into a three-dimensional globe just by pulling a tab.
